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2015 Real Estate Assessments: No Change

Property owners in Virginia Hills should have received the new assessments of their properties about a month ago. Property owners may have been surprised to see that their assessments have not changed from 2014. Since the Board of Supervisors has advertised a 2015 tax rate of \$1.09, the same as the current year's rate, Virginia Hills residents will, at worst, not see a real estate tax increase this year. The Board may ultimately decide to implement a rate lower (but not higher) than \$1.09, in which case real estate taxes will actually be lower.

For the 14th year in a row, VHCA has reviewed the assessments done by the County Department of Tax Administration (DTA) for correctness. Unlike in 2014, VHCA has found no problems with the assessments. One of the reasons that there were no changes this year was that last year the Department of Tax Administration (DTA) increased assessments by about 3% more than their sale data justified, so the small change in 2014 sales is just catching up to that.

VHCA checked a sample of 40 homes in the neighborhood to insure that the new assessments are uniform (that is, unchanged) across the neighborhood. If your assessment has gone up, one reason may be that you were issued a building permit to improve your home. Another reason may be that your house had a previous addition and DTA had incorrect data for the square footage. DTA has in the last few years been using satellite data to verity house/addition dimensions.

For the purposes of determining the change in assessments, there were 36 sales of land with improvements (homes). Of these, eight were not used for the assessment process. These included two foreclosures (the same as last year), two sales under duress, a sale by the lender, a handyman special, and two sales deemed to be at prices that were not representative.

The sales data shows that the median time of ownership was seven years. However, four of the homes sold appear to be investor fixer-uppers that were owned less than two years. If those home are eliminated from the data, the median ownership period rises to ten years.

Fairfax County assesses properties by mass appraisal, not by individual appraisal as would a mortgage lender or real estate agent. For more information on mass appraisal, see the article at http://www.dougboulter.com/policy/assessments1.html

Pothole Damage Claims

If you hit a pothole and your vehicle is damaged, you can submit a damage claim to VDOT. Claims are investigated on a case-by-case basis. Investigators review the circumstances, the type and location of the pothole, if VDOT had been previously notified of the issue, and if crews had been given a reasonable amount of time to repair the pothole.

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Parks Count Survey Released to 15,000 Households

An important park needs survey is being mailed to 15,000 randomly selected Fairfax County households. This survey is a key element of the Parks Count study being conducted by the Fairfax County Park Authority. If you receive a survey in your mailbox, please take 10 to 15 minutes to complete and return it in the return envelope provided.

Parks Count, the Park Needs Assessment Study, considers park and recreation needs, trends, and preferences in Fairfax County. The Park Authority has partnered with ETC Institute, a leading national consultant, to administer the statistically valid survey, a linchpin of the Needs Assessment Study. Households selected to receive the survey represent a random sampling that will be used to project countywide park and recreation needs. The higher the number of responses from selected households, the more accurate the projections. The survey results will help inform priorities and decisions about future park and recreation service delivery and facility improvements.

Households receiving the survey are asked to return the survey within a week. Those selected may also respond by phone or online as directed in the survey. Individuals requiring language assistance can utilize the phone number provided for translation assistance. Whether you use parks all the time or only occasionally, the Park Authority seeks your opinions and needs your completed survey.

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
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
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Beware of IRS Phone Scam from the Internal Revenue Service

The Internal Revenue Service is warning consumers about a sophisticated phone scam targeting taxpayers, including recent immigrants, throughout the country.

Victims are told they owe money to the IRS and it must be paid promptly through a pre-loaded debit card or wire transfer. If the victim refuses to cooperate, they are then threatened with arrest, deportation or suspension of a business or driver's license. In many cases, the caller becomes hostile and insulting.

"This scam has hit taxpayers in nearly every state in the country. We want to educate taxpayers so they can help protect themselves. Rest assured, we do not and will not ask for credit card numbers over the phone, nor request a pre-paid debit card or wire transfer," says IRS Acting Commissioner Danny Werfel. "If someone unexpectedly calls claiming to be from the IRS and threatens police arrest, deportation or license revocation if you don't pay immediately, that is a sign that it really isn't the IRS calling." Werfel noted that the first IRS contact with taxpayers on a tax issue is likely to occur via mail.

Other characteristics of this scam include:

 Scammers use fake names and IRS badge numbers. They generally use common names and surnames to identify themselves.

- Scammers may be able to recite the last four digits of a victim's Social Security Number.
- Scammers spoof the IRS toll-free number on caller ID to make it appear that it's the IRS calling.
- Scammers sometimes send bogus IRS emails to some victims to support their bogus calls.
- Victims hear background noise of other calls being conducted to mimic a call site.
- After threatening victims with jail time or driver's license revocation, scammers hang up and others soon call back pretending to be from the local police or DMV, and the caller ID supports their claim.

If you get a phone call from someone claiming to be from the IRS, report the incident at 1.800.366.4484.

The IRS encourages taxpayers to be vigilant against phone and email scams that use the IRS as a lure. The IRS does not initiate contact with taxpayers by email to request personal or financial information. This includes any type of electronic communication, such as text messages and social media channels. Recipients should not open any attachments or click on any links contained in the message. Instead, forward the e-mail to phishing@irs.gov.

Fall Cankerworm In Fairfax County

Fall cankerworm is a northern Virginia-native insect also known as the inchworm. They lay eggs in the fall and in the spring the young caterpillars hatch and feed, causing defoliation of deciduous trees. Fairfax County is about to embark upon a spraying campaign to kill them across 66 wooded acres, including Virginia Hills. The insecticide used is indiscriminate and kills an unknown number of other insects, including other butterfly and moth caterpillars. The treatment is controversial; county officials argue the insecticide is justified to prevent further defoliation while many environmentalists say the cankerworm is an important part of the local ecosystem, providing food for birds, bats, amphibians, and other animals. Eleven local and national non-governmental organizations oppose the spraying, including the Audobon Society and the American Horticultural Association.

Fairfax land owners who would like to opt out of the program can do so by calling 703-324-5304. Homeowners can look into creating an inviting habitat for wildlife who feed on fall cankerworm on their property as a means of alternative pest control. Fairfax County Farmers Markets Open in May From Fairfax County Park Authority

Spring is here and the 11 Fairfax County Park Authority (FCPA) Farmers Markets are gearing up for the 2015 season! All markets open the first week of May, providing residents with fresh food options until late fall. These markets are unique in that they are "producer-only" locally grown markets. All vendors come from within a 125-mile radius of Fairfax County and must grow or produce all products they sell at the market. Vendors from Virginia, Maryland, West Virginia and Southern Pennsylvania are working hard to bring the freshest produce, meats, cheese, ice cream, breads, honey, sweets, cut flowers, and plants available to Fairfax County residents.

Supporting your local farmers markets is not only delicious, but has a big impact on your health, the local economy and environment! Local produce is picked fresh, and therefore is more nutrient-rich than produce that has traveled an extended period of time. Varieties are chosen on taste and nutrient content, rather than durability. Buying from local farmers markets also helps to keep money circulating through the local economy. If each household in Virginia pledged to spend \$10 a week on locally grown agricultural products it would bring in \$1.65 billion into the Virginia economy each year! Aside from reducing your carbon footprint, buying directly from farmers also gives you the opportunity to choose to support farmers using sustainable growing practices. Sustainable farming practices help prevent soil fertility loss, while reducing pesticide and fertilizer run-off into the Chesapeake Bay watershed.
