Route 1 Widening Project from the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors

On April 23, 2015, the Northern Virginia Transportation Authority (NVTA) voted to provide an additional \$1 million for roadway and transit improvements for Route 1 from Mount Vernon Memorial Highway (Roy Rogers) to Napper Road (Costco) in their FY 2015-16 program. We heard constituents loud and clear at the community meeting on March 31, and have since been hard at work to secure additional NVTA funding for this area. Transit improvements will bring new development, residents and businesses to the area and help transform the Route 1 Corridor into a vibrant destination spot in Fairfax County.

In addition to the newly allocated \$1 million, NVTA had previously dedicated \$9 million in federal funding to this project in January 2015. This means \$10 million total has been dedicated by NVTA for widening a section of Route 1 from Mount Vernon Memorial Highway to Napper Road. The funds will be used for the design, environmental work and possibly some land acquisition associated with the widening and roadway improvement project. The project will include a center median for bus rapid transit, similar to the dedicated travel way included in the project already under construction between Mount Vernon Memorial Highway and Telegraph Road.

Securing this funding now is especially critical to capitalize on the recent Route 1 Multimodal Study, completed by the Department of Rail and Public Transit in late 2014. Roadway improvements are an important step toward realizing short-term plans for bus rapid transit and long-term plans for a Yellow Line Metro extension to Hybla Valley.

In the last 12 years, the County has invested millions of dollars in road improvements, sidewalk additions, transit, and other amenities along Route One. The additional \$1 million on top of NVTA's \$9 million investment is another step in the right direction for improving and transforming the Route 1 Corridor in Fairfax County.

Crime Solvers 5k Run Registration

This year's race is on Saturday, August 1, will again feature a fun-run for kids, a visit from McGruff the Crime Dog, lots of public safety vehicles for the kids to explore, and community activities such as child fingerprinting.

Registered runners and bystanders will also watch public safety responders compete against each other in the competitive Public Safety Challenge. This challenge pits Fairfax County's first responders from the police department, the fire department, and the sheriff's office against each other in a race for the coveted Public Safety Challenge trophy.

If runners sign up early, they pay the early-bird rate of \$25 (\$25 through July 3, 2015, 11:59 PM; \$30.00 July 4, 2015, through close of online registration [July 29, 2015 at 11:59 PM]; and \$35 at the registration table on the day of the race.

Summer is finally here which means barbeques and picnics with good friends and family. It also means being safe using a grill. Each year an average of 8,800 home fires are caused by grilling and close to half of all injuries involving grills are due to thermal burns. While nearly half of the people who grill do it year-round, July is the peak month for grill fires followed by May, June, and August. When purchasing your grill whether it be gas or propane, place the grill as far away from your home as possible. And lastly, remember to clean your grill often.

We also have a lot of homeowners in the community who are dog owners and there are several things to remember especially now that summer is here. Because dogs love to play in the back yard, remember to repair any holes in the fence to prevent dogs from hurting themselves. Avoid using any fertilizers which can be highly toxic for pets and should be dried 24 hours before the pets are in contact with them.

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
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New Huntington Farmers Market

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Message from Supervisor McKay

I chose public service as a career because I wanted to solve problems and help make my community a good place to live and work. That's why the economic storms of the recent years have been so frustrating. As our community needs have grown, our financial resources have shrunk and federal and state governments, shaken by the same economic forces, have shifted more of the burdens to local governments.

The budget for FY16 that my colleagues and I adopted on April 28 reflects the past eight years of belt tightening and shifting of resources. While it may not be a budget we can love, I believe it's one we can live with and it's the product of long months of work and feedback from public hearings, town hall meetings, letters, emails, and phone calls.

In keeping with education as our priority—52.7 percent of our General Fund budget—we came very close to fully funding the School Board's request with an increase of over \$66 million over last year. This is the closest we've come in many years to being able to fund the School Board's request. In FY16, the Schools will receive almost 2/3 of the entire increase in General Fund Revenue.

The FY16 budget also adds several key economic growth positions. We restored the cuts to critical human services programs that appeared in the County Executive's proposed budget. These include Healthy Families, as well as mental health services in the jail, and detoxification diversion positions. We also restored enforcement of the grass ordinance, an important tool for keeping our neighborhoods healthy.

We were able to hold the line on our current tax rate of \$1.09, especially important as the economic recovery has had the largest impact on neighborhoods that were hard hit during the recession. Mindful of the need to retain our triple A bond rating, we bolstered our reserves and avoided using one-time funding for recurring needs. Our triple A bond rating is very important—because of our status with the three major rating agencies, we've saved an estimated \$684.03 million from our bond and refunding sales.
