

Now that it's spring we need to be careful when going about our household chores, but when you really start tearing the house apart and moving things around during spring cleaning, especially with all those cleaning supplies and equipment out, it is doubly important to keep safety in mind. ## Tips to Get Your Yard Ready for Spring



1. Spring Cleaning: Do you have insecticides, weed killers or other household hazardous waste you want to get rid of safely? We'll take those corrosive, ignitable, toxic and reactive materials items for free at our I-66 and I-95 recycling locations.
2. Seedling Sale: Get rid of some of your lawn, and replace it with native plants, shrubs and trees. They often need less water, tolerate hot, dry summers, and offer food for wildlife. The Shrub and Small Tree Package features 10 seedlings for \$16.95. The Tree Package includes 6 seedlings sold for \$11.95. Order online at <http://bit.ly/ffxseedlings>
3. Most grasses in northern Virginia should not be fertilized in the spring. Doing so can hurt the grass and the run off damages our watershed.
4. Beware of woodchucks: No, not the animal, but scammers looking to make a quick buck and damaging your trees. Woodchucks propose to do yard work, often for marked up prices and often without the proper skills and techniques of an arborist. Some woodchucks never return to do the work. They prey on the elderly and disabled, so keep an eye out for your neighbors.
5. Free mulch: Applying a layer of organic mulch in spring will help maintain soil moisture and control weeds. We operate a brush grinding operation, which produces double-shredded wood mulch for residents. The mulch is free, clean, and of good quality. Wood mulch is usually available at the I-95 and I-66 locations. Call 703-324-5995, TTY 711 to check on current supply.

## Fairfax County Election Officials Needed



Every year since 2001, I have reviewed the assessments done by the County Department of Tax Administration (DTA) for correctness. This year, DTA's data indicates that the increase is too high. Assessments were already above the 91% of fair market value that has been DTA's standard for Virginia Hills. Even using DTA's upper limit of 95% of fair market value, the increase still seems too high.

I will be contacting DTA for an explanation and will provide the results in the June *Echo*.

The Board of Supervisors has advertised a rate of \$1.13 per \$1000 of assessed value, an increase of 4 cents over last year's rate. That means that the actual rate that the Board will pass as part of the budget cannot be more than \$1.13. At that rate, and including the 4% increase in the assessed value, most Virginia Hills homeowners can expect to see a real estate tax increase of about 8%. For a house assessed last year at \$360,000, that would amount to a tax increase of about \$307.

I sampled of 40 homes to insure that the new assessments all fell within the range shown above. This year, VHCA found that almost all of the 40 homes fell in a range of 3.95-4.15%..

Given that there are 850 homes in Virginia Hills, I advise all homeowners to check their individual assessments. Homeowners can go to <http://icare.fairfaxcounty.gov> to access the County's real estate database. Search for your property by providing its address, then go to the "Values" page of the data using the links on the left. That will give you this year's and last year's assessments. To check, subtract last year's (2015) assessment from your 2016 assessment. Divide that number by the 2015 assessment. Multiply by 100. That should give you a change of approximately 4%.

For the purposes of determining the change in assessments, there were 64 sales, of which DTA determined that 42 were at fair market value. There were 3 foreclosures in 2015. Foreclosures are recorded at the amount of the loan outstanding and are not related to the market value of the home. The 3 foreclosures in Virginia Hills are up one from two in 2014. If the home is re-sold after foreclosure,

that sale may be counted. All 3 sales by lenders in 2015 were not counted as valid sales for the purpose of the assessments.

## General Assembly Session Recap

The regular session of the 2016 General Assembly adjourned on Friday, March 11 (one day ahead of schedule). 3,286 bills and resolutions were introduced. 1,920 bills were reviewed by County operational and legal staff. Most of which were fast moving (one of the many reasons we are lucky to be one of the only local governments who have professional staff in Richmond). The Board took formal positions on 220 bills.

Numbers only tell part of the story. Perhaps most importantly, the GA passed a new 2016-2018 biennium budget which contains very good news for Fairfax County and Fairfax County Public Schools (FCPS).

The budget restores \$5.6 million in Cost of Competing Adjustment for K-12 support staff in FY2017 and \$5.8 million in FY 2018. For NOVA, the restoration of these funds was a tremendous accomplishment -- both the Governor and our General Assembly delegation deserve special thanks for helping to make this happen.

For Fairfax County, we are projecting nearly \$21 million in anticipated additional state funding for FCPS in FY 2017 which is almost a penny on the tax rate. County and FCPS budget staff are working together to provide additional detail about this funding. This will continue to be a long process, but strong steps were made towards the goal of more funding for education this year.

While we did not see the usual onslaught of problematic tax bills this year, the GA did consider a number of bills that diminish the county's land use authority. The most consequential of these bills, related to proffers, has already been signed into law by Governor McAuliffe. That legislation includes numerous exemptions from the new requirements that will be especially helpful for Fairfax County, but it will take the Board and staff time to fully assess and adjust to the changes brought by the new law.

Overall, this was a productive legislative session and I am proud and honored to serve as the Legislative Committee Chairman.
